• **Archaeological Conservancy Lecture II at the Cleveland Museum of Natural History: The Anthony Wayne: Fact or Fiction**

Event Description: Join nautical archaeologist Carrie Sowden while we explore an early Lake Erie sidewheel steamer. The *Anthony Wayne* was built in Perrysburg in 1838, just 20 years after the first steamer was introduced on Lake Erie. After a relatively short life, her boiler exploded on April 28, 1850 and she sank about 5 miles off Vermilion, Ohio. She lay at the bottom of the lake, undisturbed for more than 150 years, until she was discovered by Tom Kowalczyk of the Cleveland Underwater Explorers. Ms. Sowden and a team of archaeologists from Texas A&M University have been studying this wreck for the past two years. This talk will explore the history of the Wayne and discuss the ongoing underwater archaeological investigation.
